



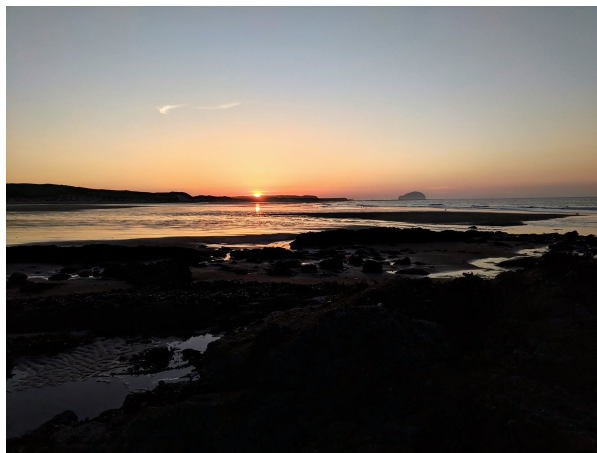

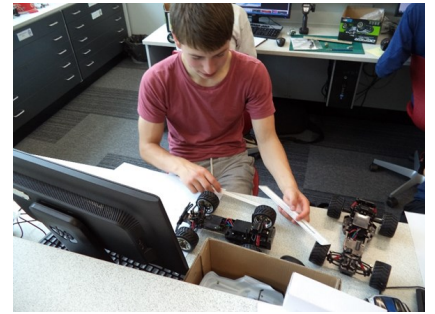

S2 STEM ROADSHOW

The focus of the road show was engineering and maths and the importance of the subjects on everyday life e.g. jumping of a swing and knowing exactly where you would land and card tricks.



They also showed us how advanced maths and engineering can be with a paramotor and MIA the talking, dancing, talking robot. The S2 pupils really enjoyed it and some were even brave enough to volunteer to help with demonstrations!



Engineering Showcase

On Tuesday 2nd October Mr MacDonald took 33 S3 Engineering Science students to Dynamic Earth for an Engineering Showcase. They watched and took part in many activities and spoke to Engineers from many fields. They then had a presentation from the engineer who designed and built the “Marty” robot.

FANTASTIC PLASTIC

S4 Chemistry go Fantastic for Plastic!

Around 100 S4 Chemists attended a talk at Napier University. The talk was given by Professor Averil Macdonald OBE from the University of Reading and a leading expert in polymers (the more accurate scientific term for plastics!). She enthusiastically encouraged the pupils to be entrepreneurial in their approach to learning about these natural and synthetic materials. She gave examples of how people have created new materials and products for the benefit of society (and made a fortune £\$£\$ in the process!). The S4s were able to think about how some of the more harmful environmental issues surrounding the use and disposal of plastics can be reduced now and in the future. Professor Macdonald is a self-confessed lover of tech and made bold-predictions of the use of polymers in the coming years including roll-up TVs and augmented reality contact lens (Teachers be aware!).



S1 – Race for the Line Project.

As part of the IDL project with Design & Engineering and Science, all our S1 Computing classes learnt how to program the Micro:bits which were used to carry out the timing mechanism on the race track. Under the direction of staff from the Royal Naval Base at Rosyth the pupils raced their rocket cars in the playground with the winning teams going on to the regional and Scottish finals at Rosyth dockyard and the Barracks in Colinton.

S3 – BIMA Digital Day

Twenty Five S3 Computing and Business pupils took part in the initiative where we were partnered with local company Emperor to help promote awareness of careers in the Digital Sector. Our two winning groups for the day were shortlisted for the Final – well done!

YOUNG ENTERPRISE

Meraki is now the official name of our Young Enterprise business for 2018-19 - watch out for us around the school. The name comes from the Greek word which is used to describe doing something with soul, creativity, or love — when you put “something of yourself” into what you're doing. Our business adviser Adam George has been a big help and we look forward to the help and support he will provide. One of the best learning activities we have participated in was called Colours where we had to rate ourselves on a

scale when asked about our personal qualities and preferences. We are looking forward to our Training Day at RBS at the Gogarburn HW on Saturday, 6 October where we will meet lots of different Scottish entrepreneurs, experts from finance and marketing.



Business Management Live!

On 30th of August 40 of our Higher Business Management students attended the conference at Napier University with over 100 other business students from various Edinburgh schools. The event had a focus on marketing with interesting presentations from Cameron McLay, BasketballScotland, Chris Marsh, Carat and Colin Reid, ForthOne. Each speaker shared an insight into the importance of marketing, the role it plays and how they use market-

ing in their various careers and industries. Quote from one of the speakers on the day “marketing is not normal.....you have to be obsessed by people’s behaviour”. Feedback from



our students showed they found it interesting with regards to the career path options in Business and “how powerful some aspects of business are in our modern day”.

MATHS WEEK SCOTLAND

“Numeracy

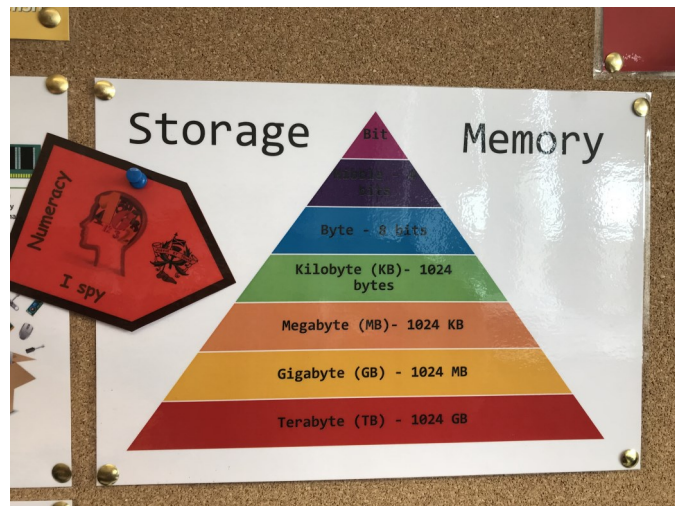
During “Maths Week Scotland” in September, the Maths department was involved in a variety of activities.

They ran a Numeracy “I Spy” competition for S1, and pupils looked for Numeracy icons around the school: in classes, corridors, notice boards and offices, demonstrating where there was evidence of Numeracy across the curriculum. They recorded this on a card and were awarded prizes: badges, chocolate or the winning prize of Cineworld vouchers.

Mrs Walker’s S1 and S2 classes participated in a competition called “Maths Wi’ Nae Borders” involving Scottish-based problem-solving in groups, and await the results of the competition.

All S2 and S3 pupils were presented for the Manga High Maths Week Scotland competition. Borougmuir High School came 12th in Scotland, with Shahed Jaroucheh winning an Amazon voucher for being placed 5th in Scotland.

Following this, more than 100 S1 parents and careers attended a Numeracy Parental Engagement event led by Mrs Walker and Mrs Craig. The presentation involved providing advice and guidance on how to help their child with Maths and Numeracy in S1 and they all left with a pack of information and activities to assist them with this.”

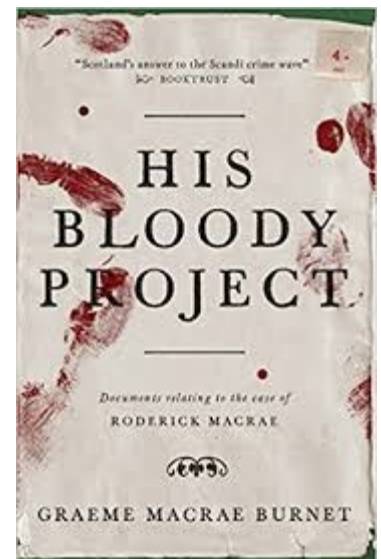

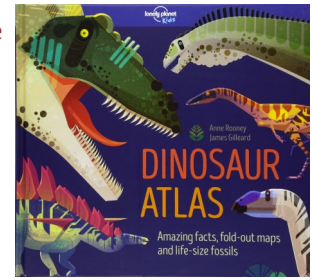

Royal Society Young People's Book Prize 2018

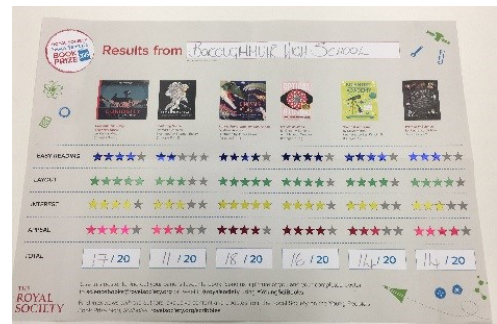
Before the Summer holidays, Ms Aleksandrowicz (Library), registered the school to take part in the Royal Society Young People's Book Prize 2018. The school received a free set of the six shortlisted books – which are all based around Science - in return for pupils voting for their favourite. Working with Mrs Hearnden in Science, around 100 pupils from S1 and S2 visited the library during their Science period to judge and vote on the books. Pupils were asked to think about the following questions when reviewing:



- **How does it look?**
- **Is it well written?**
- **What makes it interesting?**
- **How much does it appeal to you?**
- **Would you recommend this book to a friend?**

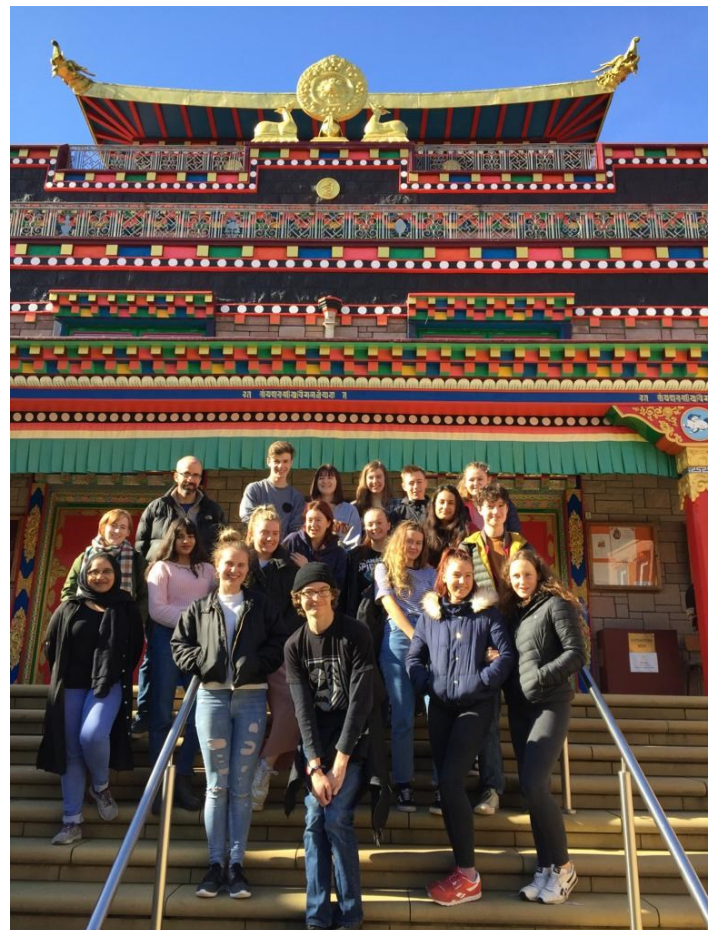
In small groups each class reviewed and scored each book out of five for four different areas; Easy Layout, Layout, Interest and Appeal, giving a total score of 20. Each group had a chair person whose job it was to make sure everyone got look at the book, have their say and settle any arguments over scoring! At the end of the review process everyone was asked to pick their favourite book and say why.

After all the results were counted Boroughmuir pupils picked **'Lonely Planet Kids' Dinosaur Atlas'** which scored 18/20.

S2 Interdisciplinary Learning

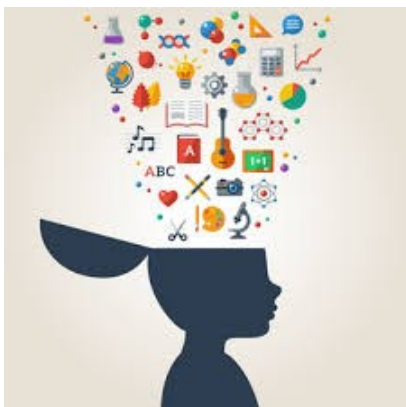

In August, 12 members of the student leadership team in S6 embarked on a week-long trip to Outward Bound's Ullswater Centre. The objective was to develop the leadership skills of the young people on this trip by placing them in challenging, outdoor-learning based scenarios.

The group departed on the Monday morning and upon arrival at the centre were allocated their rooms for the remainder of the week. A variety of tasks ensued including a 9ft wall climb and a jog and dip into Ullswater's lake. There was a smattering of complaints about the temperature of the water but in reality it was positively refreshing!



The highlight of the week was the overnight expedition which included a summit of Helvellyn. Each group member adopted a role for the expedition including Team Leader, Head of Catering and Equipment Manager. The group was responsible for all the navigation with the instructors only offering advice when asked. The ascent was successfully completed in glorious sunshine with a 360° view of the surrounding area*!

Accommodation for the night was the Outward Bound hut at the foot of the mountain. The comfort of the hut was gratefully received after a long day on the mountain. Those more used to the sparseness of a Scottish bothy were surprised at the luxury of this mountain dwelling; a gas stove and spacious wooden platforms greeted the group on their arrival and the catering team immediately set about feeding the hungry mountaineers.



The next morning, the group awoke to the sound of torrential rain hammering off the roof of the hut. A 6km walk to the southern edge of the lake where the students' canoes were waiting for them was completed swiftly. There was time to refuel as the canoes were tied together before the group headed north on a 7km paddle back to the centre.

There was time for cliff-jumping, gorge scrambling, raft building and even some underground cartography in the centre's tunnel system before the group finished their week with the obligatory jetty jumping.



The 12 students all had a fantastic time and were ruing their return to school on the Monday. Outward Bound delivered a "proper" Leadership course, really testing and developing the skills of the young people. Every task was challenging but the group surpassed expectations and proved they were the real deal when it came to student leadership.

This is what they said to us at the end of the day:

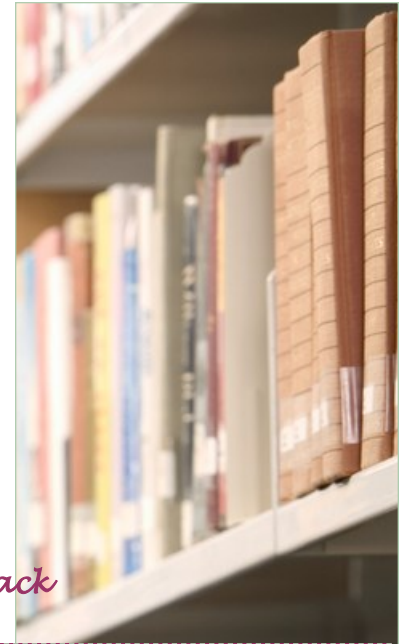
What surprised you most about the day?

- *Seeing the school with pupils in it was so calm.*



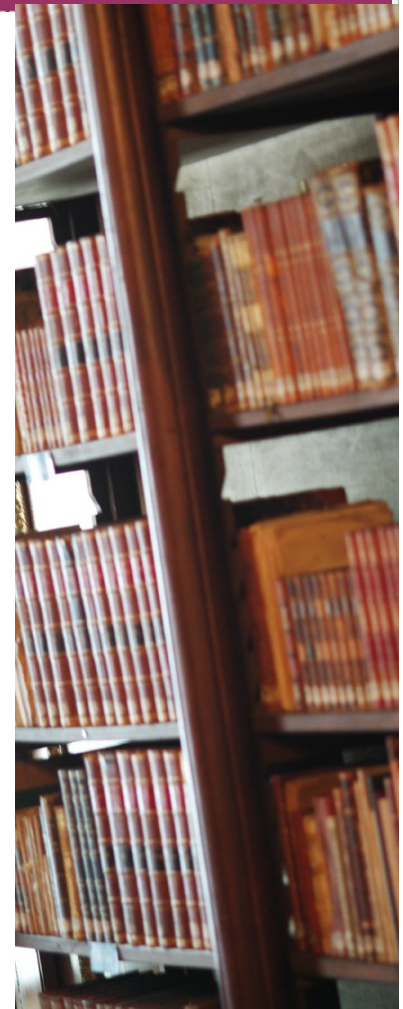

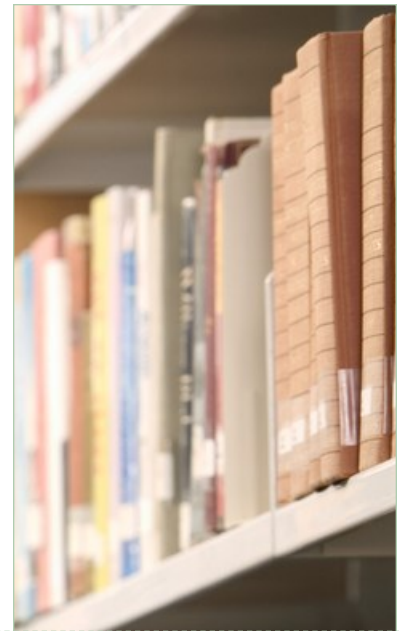

S2 Skyscanner Trip

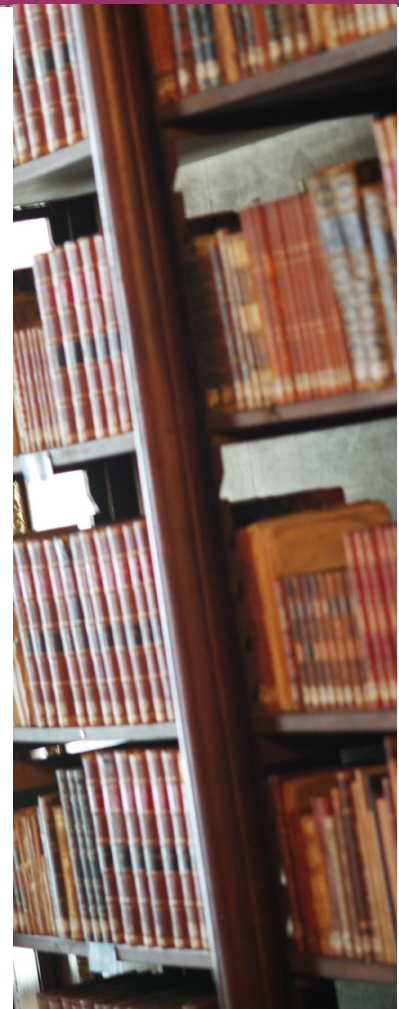
