"I never usually have breakfast..but I do now"


"My brain can work things out more easily first thing in the morning".


BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS IN S1

get together. Next event is the S1 Christmas Party in December followed by the Panto and the


















STEM - S2 DIGITAL EXPLORERS

Developing the Young Workforce Developing the Young Work-

force (DYW), and in particular Employability skills, is a key focus for the school this year and features highly on our improvement plan. To help pupils further understand the skills they are gaining in their subjects each Faculty is giving a presentation to each year group Assembly over the course of a week which will outline the skills they are developing in each subject and highlight some possible career choices that use these skills. These subject Assemblies follow on from an Assembly from Skills Development Scotland (SDS) which informed pupils all about the Career Management Standards.

The first of these Faculty Assemblies was from Computing Science and Business Education who highlighted the keys skills these subjects bring and also the huge array of possible career paths open to pupils who decide to take Computing Science, Business Management or Economics.



Almost all jobs in the future will involve working as part of a Business and will most definitely involve Digital Skills and so having an opportunity to develop skills in both these

subject areas will help pupils in whatever future career they choose to follow. From Computing Science pupils heard about careers such as Programming and Web Development but also about opportunities such as Ethical Hacking to combat Cyber Crime and to develop the next generation of AI Applications. From Business pupils found out about the diversity of opportunities that a Business qualification provide a pathway to including careers in Marketing, Finance, Advertising, HR, Retail and Logistics.



S2 Interdisciplinary Learning – Royal Mile, Holyrood Park and Our Dynamic Earth

On the 25th & 26th September all of S2 ventured out to experience some Interdisciplinary learning focussed on the 4 aspects of the John Muir Award – Discovering, Exploring, Conserving and Sharing. This is a follow up to

their visits to Hermitage of Braid in May. They were utilising skills from across their curriculum to complete an Outdoor Learner Journey down the Royal Mile. This was followed by a trip to Our Dynamic Earth and a walk through some of the more hidden trails within Holyrood Park. The learner journey down the Royal Mile was based around a theme chosen by the pupils themselves. These themes ranged from Mythical Beasts to Tourism to Closes. We were also joined by on of our parents Mrs Walker to help with some geology in Holyrood Park. Many staff from across the school supported the day.





INTERNATIONAL DAY OF LANGUAGES

On Thursday September 26th Boroughmuir High School again successfully celebrated the many languages spoken by our talented staff and pupils with the annual Day of Languages event. Over 15 languages were represented on the day; ranging from those from closer to home with Welsh and Gaelic, to those from further afield, like Japanese and Afrikaans. It was great to see so many of our junior pupils turning up and enthusiastically taking part. It was clear that we also have some potentially fantastic language teachers in the making! Delicious cakes and treats were on sale from the

Charities Committee, who donated the profits to an organisation focusing on mental health.

A massive Merci, Danke schön, Gracias etc. to all who contributed to and attended the event.



S₂ HISTORY

In S2 History, the students have been learning about many of the everyday changes and experiences of Germans living under the new Nazi government in the early 1930s. This includes the changes to education, to the organisation of youth activities, the traditional and restricted role for girls and women and the development of widespread censorship, propaganda and terror. It's important for them to also learn about those Germans who stood up to the new Nazi ideas and publicly opposed them, often facing extreme risks as they did so.

In class we watched some key scenes from the German language film, Sophie Scholl, which focus on the way the Scholl siblings, Hans and Sophie, distributed antigovernment leaflets in Munich in 1943, were caught, charged with treason and faced a show trial. Classes learned too about the anti-Hitler graffiti the White Rose group painted on the walls of churches and even Nazi party buildings in that city. The lesson allowed for a good sense of Interdisciplinary Learning (IDL) as it focused on key historical themes alongside a linked element of German language phrases and an opportunity to be creatively engaged with the historical activities of the young opponents of the German government. Most importantly, the students enjoyed the activity and com-

pleted the task at home to a very high standard leading to a very impressive display of a Munich wall in 1943 in their classroom. Well done S2s!



" A Question of Taste "

Some senior pupils were given the opportunity to attend a workshop at the Easter Bush Outreach Science Centre (EBSOC) at the Roslin Institute. It was a full day, hands-on event in a purpose-built teach-

ing laboratory using techniques covered in the Higher Human Biology course.

Using their own DNA extracted from cheek cells, they used Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) to make multiple copies, used restrictive enzyme digestion and gel

electrophoresis to separate their DNA fragments.




They were given the opportunity to use cutting - edge equipment and carried out a number of activities to enhance their understanding of technology in research.

The results allowed them to determine which version of the bitter taste receptor

gene TAS2R38 they have for PCP, the compound similar to the one found in sprouts. (Check with them before serving up sprouts this Xmas, some people are 'strong tasters'!)

They were assisted through the day by Jayne Quoiani, E.B.S.O.Cs Education Officer and staff from the University of Edinburgh Centre for Inflammation Research giving the pupils insight into study and work opportunities in the field.



Boroughmuir Launches its Canoe Club!!

On Friday 27th September Boroughmuir took to the water for the very first time!!! Our wonderful Canalside school has recently purchased kayaks and Canadian canoes to allow pupils to start connecting with the Union Canal which passes by the front door of the school.

The Head Teacher Mr Dempster said, "We are delighted to be one of the very few, if not the only, school to have direct access onto a waterway where now our pupils can engage in a whole new set of activities and clubs involving water sports. Today we are dipping our toes in for the first time with our kayaks and Canadian canoes but in time we want to expand this to include rowing and paddle boarding."

Parent and accomplished kayaker Cynthia Berry, organised the inaugural session which involved about 14 pupils. Cynthia has been involved with kayaking on the union canal for many years but the opportunity to have a club based at the school and launching onto the canal from our front door was an opportunity Cynthia relished.



We look forward to expanding the membership of our new club in the weeks and months ahead.

This year's Libraries Week ran from the 5th – 12th October, with the them of 'Libraries in the Digital World'. Over the course of the week, S1 pupils visited the school library where they were given the task of making Binary Code bracelet. To do this, pupils were shown how 'o's and '1's can be represented by colour beads (for example a white bead is 'o' and a black bead '1') and by using the Binary Code Alphabet could create a bracelet that had their initials in Binary Code.


Samye Ling Higher RMPS/ Philosophy Trip 2019

Waterstones New Book




The LRC went to an evening to Waterstones to get some new books ideas and manged to snatch some freebies that are now added to the library. Lots of good new reads!

Hong Kong Scotland School Improvement Partnership

Boroughmuir is a founder school in the Hong Kong Scotland School Improvement Partnership (HKSSIP).

Its aim is promote cultural exchange for pupils between Hong Kong and Scotland as well as providing opportunities for teachers to learn from each other's systems.

In the week 2nd – 9th November Boroughmuir hosted 5 pupils and 1 teacher from Hong Kong with the pupils all being accommodated in host families.

They were part of a larger delegation of 50 pupils and 16 teachers and Head Teachers from Hong Kong. The other Edinburgh schools involved were James Gillespie's, St Thomas', Liberton, Gracemount, Balerno, the Royal High School and Knox Academy East Lothian.



It was a tremendous week with great friendships being formed which will hopefully last a lifetime.

Here is some feedback from one of the Hong Kong pupils.

On the first day of school, I could totally feel the differences between Hong Kong and Edinburgh.

To begin with, it was raining when we went to school. Almost all pedestrians did not take an umbrella, they just wore hats. When in Rome, do as the Romans do—I didn't take an umbrella or a raincoat out. We took bus and then walk a short distance to school. I found that Scottish people can cope with rainy days calmly. Perhaps it's exactly because of the different environments that cause the differences in how we handle adversity.

When I came to school, I met the head teacher, Mr Dempster and he treated us well with big smile. I really appreciated his kindness. Then we started to get to know students in our sister school by a ice-breaking-game. It really enhanced my confidence through communicating with them. In addition, the students showed us around and told me about their school with patience. They had over 20 subjects to choose which was really amazed me. And they could learn how to dance in PE lesson.

After paying a visit around school, we had lessons with our buddies. To be honest, it's quiet challenging for me to understand what Scottish teachers had taught about. From my perspective, I could feel that it was quite free for students in class. In other words, it seemed that students could chat anytime but they can focus on their work in a short time when there was class work distributed by teacher. Also, they had their own realization about what they could do or what they could not do without certain rules. Although I could not understand the learning content of the class most of the time, I still felt that the students here were strongly self-regulated.

The most wonderful lesson I had was Mandarin. The reason why I described as wonderful was because they had different ways for Scottish students to learn a new language. Teacher could teach some words through games in order to let students gain more interests in learning Mandarin. Also, I could feel that Scottish teacher was keen on teaching and learning Mandarin. Every language has its own meaning to learn. Now I see why we need to have some exchange programs around the world.

At the end of the day, we had eight people all together to have dinner. It was still raining but the wind was so strong that our umbrella flew up so we ran to the restaurant as quick as we could. I noticed Scottish people got used to a quite change in weather. Let us try to live with it.
